

Brummana High School (BHS) has provided excellence in education since its establishment in 1873. The school provides Lebanese, British and international programmes from KG1 to Grade 12 for over 1,250 boys and girls, and caters for both day students and boarders. BHS follows













the academic programmes, which include the Cambridge AS / A Levels and IGCSEs as well as the International Baccalaureate Diploma Programme. The school prides itself on providing an affordable education, in part through a Bursary (Financial Aid) scheme, with 40% of students receiving some form of assistance, ensuring students from a diverse mix of socioeconomic backgrounds. Over 45 nationalities are represented within the student body.



## Historic school with modern approach to education centred around the Quaker ideals of...




Graduates of the school (old scholars) go on to study at some of the world's leading universities. During their careers, many old scholars hold distinguished and remarkable roles in politics and other sectors right around the world. BHS is governed by a UK registered Quaker charity and British nationals are prominent amongst the leadership and staff. Thus, the continuation of the school's strong British roots is ensured, from the opening of Edinburgh Boarding House in 1967 by H.R.H. Prince Philip, the Duke of Edinburgh, to a house system with houses originally named Oxford and Cambridge. The BHS motto 'I Serve' heralds the act of service in the whole school community, actively displayed by students to teachers, by parents to administrators, and by old scholars to governors.







BHS students are unique, happy and successful global citizens, supported by an excellent pastoral care programme. The Quaker ideals the school was founded upon are evident in every student: respect, simplicity, peaceful resolution, tolerance, equality, justice and sustainability. Students are treated as individuals by the staff and are confident and enjoy freedom of expression, particularly important in Lebanon with the wealth of religions and sects in the country. They develop strong leadership, public speaking and debating skills, with both independence and collaboration encouraged. Indeed, the school's annual Model United Nations conference is a rich and rewarding experience for BHS students as well as invited national and international guests. Students are friends and, indeed, the community as a whole is one of friendship.



Situated in the Mount Lebanon region, 750 metres above sea level and 25 minutes from the Lebanese capital Beirut, BHS offers students and all members of the community a space and environment to flourish. The beautiful, sprawling and safe campus, spread over 15 acres between the towns of Brummana and Roumieh, offers fresh air, nature, security and of course panoramic views of the Lebanese coastline and Mediterranean Sea. Above the capital's pollution level, with pine trees dating back hundreds of years and in an area known as a very secure zone, modern facilities are mixed seamlessly with historic buildings established in the 1870s.
